

Solid Waste Authority News

Retiring U.S. Flags - When a U.S. flag becomes so tattered that it can no longer serve as a symbol of the United States, the U.S. Flag Code says it should be retired in a dignified manner. The SWA has made it easy for residents to retire an old American flag. Just drop it off in the special drop box at the SWA Home Chemical & Recycling Center located at 6161 N. Jog Road in West Palm Beach and your flag will be retired with respect and honor.

Recycling Mail & Magazines - When you're done going through your mail and have removed any personal information, put it into the yellow recycling bin. When mail and magazines from your yellow recycling bin arrive at the SWA recycling facility, they're sorted from other paper materials and sold to mills and manufacturers to make new paper products. If you have more paper than will fit into your yellow recycling bin, you may bring it to the recycling center located at 6161 N. Jog Road in West Palm Beach.



To report a noise complaint during Town Hall business hours of Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., call code enforcement at 561-689-0370 Ext 3. Outside of normal business hours, residents should dial the PBSO non-emergency number at 561-688-3400. The important thing to know about calling PBSO is that when they ask if you'd like a follow-up call, say YES. Otherwise, a Deputy may not even respond to the complaint.

The Palm Beach County Tax Collector recently added an express vehicle registration kiosk at the Publix at Village Commons located at 831 Village Blvd in West Palm Beach. The kiosks are a convenient way to renew and print motor vehicle registration and decal on the spot in a matter of minutes. To renew vehicle registration at one of these "ATM-like" kiosks, vehicle owners will need a registration renewal notice PIN or their license plate number, the date of birth of the first registered owner and a credit/debit card.



Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office recommends making alternate arrangements for package deliveries in light of recent package thefts in the area, especially during the holiday season. Options include scheduling a delivery when you will be home; selecting the option to sign for your package upon delivery; providing a package box near your front door that has a locking mechanism; utilizing the UPS Access Point system; renting a parcel locker from a local pack & ship store; or delivering your Amazon packages to pickup locations.

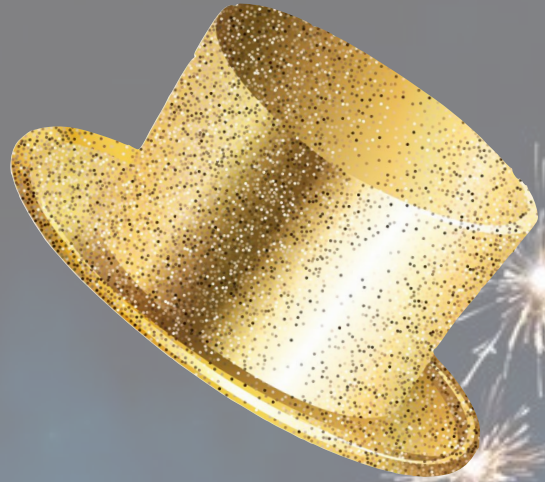

Protect our Storm Water Drainage Systems

The Town of Haverhill is regulated by the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) program. This program regulates storm water discharges that lead directly to surface waters. The storm water drainage system collects all the rainwater that runs off hard surfaces such as roofs and sidewalks. This storm water runoff drains into catch basins. If that runoff contains pollutants, then those pollutants are routed to the nearest canal, lake and eventually the ocean. Water pollution damages the environment and wildlife and can restrict recreational activities like fishing, swimming and boating.

Please help us protect our waterways by controlling discharge pollution. Be aware of an accidental oil or paint spill, soapy wash water, wastewater and grease that may be draining into our catch basins. These are pollutants and illicit discharges. Please do not blow grass clippings into the storm drains and remind landscapers not to as well.

Every little bit helps and we appreciate your efforts to help protect our environment!
